The Mary Geist Service Award recognizes individuals who have exhibited outstanding volunteer service to Bishop Hartley. The 2020 Award was presented to Mr. Matt Murphy '88 and Mr. Mike Selegue '71 at an all-school assembly.

Matt Murphy is the owner/operator of TT Murph's and a member of St. Catharine Parish. Mike is also a member of Charity Newsies, an organization which provides clothing for school-aged children in need.

Matt, his wife, Jonell and daughter TT (Bishop Hartley Class of 2031) are proud supporters of Bishop Hartley. Many of our athletes have benefited from Tuesday night fundraisers at Murph's from which he donates 50% of pizza proceeds to the sponsoring sports team.

In addition to countless sponsorships, the Murphy family joins together to fund the James D. Murphy Family Scholarship for the benefit of deserving Hartley students.

Mike Selegue and his family moved into the neighborhood while Hartley was being built. He grew up down the street from the school. During the time he attended Hartley, he played football and baseball. Mike's family has always served the Hartley Community: his mother was the president of the school board, and his father was part of the chain gang during the football games.

The oldest of seven siblings, all of whom graduated from Hartley, Mike also has two sons who both graduated from Hartley.

Mike always kept a close eye on Hartley athletics even long after he graduated. He enjoys photography as a hobby, and when his sons were playing sports, he would attend with his camera. In his retirement, Mike made a particular effort to incorporate as many sports into his hobby as possible, not just football. He tried to provide as many parents and athletes with his pictures as possible. We are grateful for the photos he has provided to us over the years.

Friday, March 13, 2020 was a Friday the 13th unlike any Bishop Hartley had seen before. What everyone thought was the beginning of a three-week extension of the spring break period turned out to be the last day students were in the building for the 2019-2020 school year. In fact, students and teachers did not return to in-person classes for six months.


Following the directives from Ohio Governor Mike DeWine, the Diocese of Columbus, and both the state and city health departments, Bishop Hartley administration gathered individuals to determine the best way to serve our students during the time away. Academic Dean, Christopher Kowalski, worked with others to create a modified block schedule; the technology team made sure all students had working devices to use at home; intervention specialists made plans for students needing assistance; the school nurse followed developments regarding the coronavirus, and school counselors met countless other needs for students including making arrangements for those who might need assistance with getting meals at home. After students left for the day, teachers met for a "crash course" in how to set up lessons for students using PowerSchool®, our student information system, and we all learned that Zoom meant much more than to move quickly. It was now the way we would "meet."

As the 2020-2021 school year began, students, faculty, and staff returned to familiar, yet changed surroundings. While much remained the same, hallways now had directional arrows; signs reminded all to wear a mask, wipe down surfaces, wash hands, and watch distance; extra furniture and desks had been removed from classrooms so desks could be spread apart; and lockers were off limits.

What remained was the heart and soul of the Hartley Community. Teachers spent the summer getting ready for what we all know is the most unusual year most of us will ever see. The maintenance crew had spent months getting the building ready to meet new safety protocols. The technology department had been busy researching the best ways to meet everyone's needs and order the needed technology. Most significantly, administration had developed a hybrid model which all have been following since school began in September.

Our current hybrid model includes a Red Group, Blue Group, and Hawks at Home. The Red and Blue Groups alternate days in the building while the Hawks at Home are students whose families have decided that all-virtual learning is the best option for them right now.

No matter which group students are in, they are all part of each class every day. Through the use of Microsoft Teams®, teachers set up meetings for each class period which students who are not in the building can join using their school-issued device. A 65" screen in each classroom enables all students to participate in the class at the same time. With synchronous learning, classes are able to continue at a normal pace with all students, every day. Teachers continue to post information and assignments to the PowerSchool® student information system, so students have information they need literally at their fingertips. If students are absent from a class for any reason, they can contact teachers and counselors and make up assignments through this system as well. All assignments can be handed in electronically whether students are in the building or learning at home.

Students and teachers have adapted well to the new technology and continue to explore its potential uses. Much of what we learn now will carry well beyond the pandemic situation and expand to more applications as we move forward together keeping Hartley on the cutting edge of technology.

Spirit Week 2020

Since a traditional Homecoming was not possible this year, students participated in *Spirit Week 2020*, October 12-17, 2020, an effort coordinated by Ms. Cara Rezabek, Mrs. Andrea Klein, Ms. Liz Collette, Ms. Molly Hartge ('04), and Mrs. Heather Rush ('03).

The week began with prayer services for both the Red and Blue Hybrid groups. Hawks at Home, our online students, were able to join a service virtually during the mentor group period. Students at school enjoyed a Red & Blue dress day Monday and Tuesday.





Wednesday was National Testing Day for freshmen, sophomores, and juniors. Seniors had the day off to work on college applications and visit colleges.

Thursday and Friday were Western theme dress days and included a Spirit Rally at the end of each day featuring members of our Homecoming Court. Brenda has 25+ years of leadership experience in business development, sales, and operations with an entrepreneurial spirit. A product of Catholic Schools herself, Brenda served as a member on the Board of Catholic Social Services for four years, where she focused on fundraising development. Brenda understands and appreciates the value of building long-term relationships and serving others. The challenges brought about by current circumstances have been many. We were unable to have our annual auction, which resulted in the loss of our largest Hartley fundraiser. However, we have received generous donations from 98 individuals and organizations, which have contributed \$234,000 to Hartley for scholarships and tuition assistance in the last year. Our annual goal is to reach \$300,000 by the end of this calendar year to help financially support our Hartley students in 2021.

We are pleased to share that Hartley is the recipient of two grants from The Catholic Foundation. The first for \$1,150 was for a new promotional video to share all that Hartley has to offer its students. The second in the amount of \$4,650 was designated for the purchase and installation of new security cameras. Hartley also received a Black and Indian Mission Grant in the amount of \$5.000.









Putting Bur Values into Action

As we continue to transform lives through the teachings of Jesus Christ within the Catholic tradition, Bishop Hartley has instituted a new Social Justice curriculum this year. The Bowman and Des Porres Social Justice Curriculum is named after St. Martin Des Porres and Sister Thea Bowman, two models of the Catholic and Christian faith. Representing the Dominican and Franciscan Orders, both are persons of color in the Catholic Tradition and serve as role models for social justice and our commitment to racial justice.

The goal of the curriculum, which will be used in all subjects at all grade levels, is for each Bishop Hartley student to grow in Christian virtues in order to demonstrate civil discourse and exercise social justice.

As with everything we do at Bishop Hartley, the Bowman and Des Porres Social Justice Curriculum will build upon our six pillars. For the pillar of Faith, we will focus on virtue development. A revamped Senior Creed project will focus on the pillar of Preparation. We will address the pillar of Community through our clubs and organizations. For the pillar of Spirit, we will celebrate diversity and civil discourse. Service will be the pillar for social justice-oriented projects, and we will develop Leadership through social justice training.

While this will be an ongoing effort, there are specific initiatives planned for the 2020-2021 school year:

- Senior Symposium
 - A Senior Capstone project synthesizing major components from English, house, religion, and social studies curriculums culminating in reflection.
- Civil Discourse
 - Educating students and providing respect-based boundaries to discuss difficult topics, varying experiences, and differing opinions. This year we added special emphasis on the election.
- Social Justice Training & Forums
 - Developing student leadership and voices in matters of social justice affecting our school community and creating safe spaces to openly discuss and create action plans.
- Professional Learning Community
 - Faculty-led development of critical consciousness and reflection on race, racism, and antiracism through ongoing discussions and activities.
- Clubs & Organizations
 - Providing students opportunities beyond the school curriculum to be actively involved in Social Justice through various outlets. This effort is well underway with the formation of the CARE Team (Catholic Anti-Racist Educators) and My Brother's Keeper, a student program led by health teacher Marcus Phelps with the mission to enhance belonging among students of color through leadership opportunities. The focus of the program is to build bridges over the many walls that can easily divide us, within our school and in our community, while holding healthy dialogue on necessary issues and acquiring leadership skills.

Student Safety

Providing students with a safe and secure learning environment is always a top priority. This year, that has taken on new aspects as many of our changes and procedures are in response to the global pandemic; however, we have added some other safety aspects as well.

As we continue to expand our facilities and events, it is imperative to be able to monitor activity in and around the building. Additional and upgraded cameras have been added in several areas to help with this task. In addition, a new set of walkie talkies helps safety personnel stay in contact with administrators and others throughout the school day and during extra-curricular events.

This year, we are pleased to have added Tim Schmitz, '82, to our safety team. Recently retired from the Columbus Police Department, students see him throughout the day in many areas of the building, and he is often the one they see as they leave after-school activities and events.



The changes made in response to the pandemic are both physical and procedural. They include

- Daily Health Assessments: Everyone is expected to monitor for COVID-19 symptoms and stay home if they are ill.
- Expanded Nurse's Office: Students who become ill at school can now be isolated from others until a parent can pick them up.
- Physical/Social Distancing: We strive to maintain physical distancing among all persons on school grounds. Directional floor markings in halls, signage, and other strategies reinforce social distancing.
- Face Coverings: Everyone on school grounds and waiting for or utilizing school transportation must wear face coverings.
- Good Hygiene Practices: Handwashing is encouraged; hand sanitizer is available for staff and students, especially in high traffic areas, including at the school entrance.
 High contact surfaces such as desks, doorknobs, light switches, etc. are sanitized frequently.
- Masks: All teachers, staff, and students are required to wear masks from the time they
 enter the school building until the time they leave.
- Lockers: Students are not using lockers. They are permitted to carry bookbags.
- Locker Rooms: There is no access to any locker room facilities.
- Entrances and Exits: Students enter and exit the building through the same door daily. Departure times are staggered to avoid having too many students in an area at a time.
- Visitors: In order to minimize the number of visitors in the building, all parent meetings are conducted over the phone or online. No visitors are admitted to the building unless they have an appointment.
- Cleaning: The building maintenance staff has a daily schedule for disinfecting and cleaning. In addition, desks and tables are disinfected at the end of each class and lunch period.

Response and cooperation from our students and parents has been outstanding. We will continue to adjust our procedures in all areas as changes happen and we learn more.

- Dance, Musicals, Vocal Ensemble, and Concert Choir





Twice Blessed with Co-Chaplains



This year, Bishop Hartley students, faculty, and staff are blessed to have Co-Chaplains available to meet the spiritual needs of our community. Both work closely with Campus Minister, Tera Chun, '04, to plan liturgical celebrations and other activities to keep faith alive and thriving among all.

Deacon Frank Sullivan began teaching at Hartley in the fall of 1993 and has remained here since. He began his studies for the diaconate in 1997, and after his ordination, began his role as Chaplain. In addition to teaching, he has also served as the Religion Department Chair and even coached football for a while under Coach Dick Geyer.

Fr. Fulton is new to Bishop Hartley this year. Originally from Denver, Fr. Fulton's family moved to Delaware where he was a member of St. John Neumann Parish in Sunbury. His experiences with Youth Group there and close proximity to the Pontifical College Josephinum, were influential in his calling to the priesthood. Upon Fr. Fulton's ordination in June 2020, Bishop Brennan assigned him to Christ the King Parish as Parochial Vicar and to Bishop Hartley as Co-Chaplain.
